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1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

1.1 INTRODUCTION

Marathwada Shikshan Prasarak Mandal, Aurangabad was established in 1958 with the mission of "Let's proceed from darkness to light". It celebrated the "Golden Jubilee Year" in 2009. It has emerged as a premier and the largest educational organization in the Marathwada region. The organization runs 23 higher education institutes including Law, Engineering, M.B.A., B.Ed., Pharmacy, Polytechnic colleges, etc. It also provides education through 56 high schools, 39 higher secondary and 14 primary and 11 English medium schools. One of the institutes belong to the M.S.P. Mandals, Devgiri College, Aurangabad secured 3.59 in 4th cycle of accreditation which is highest grade obtained by the institutes in the Maharashtra. It is credited with 02 A++, 02 A+ Grade to colleges in the 4th cycle, and 04 colleges with the status of 'College with Potential for Excellence'. Its 4000 dedicated staff educates more than 1,00,000 students. The Government of Maharashtra honored it as the "Best Educational Institute" in 2002.

Response:

Owing to affiliation of Dr. B.A.M. University, Aurangabad, M.S.P. Mandal's Sunderrao Solanke Mahavidyalaya, Majalgaon has to implement the curriculum designed and prescribed by the university.

Planning:

- The **IQAC** plays an important role to ensure effective curriculum planning and delivery through a well-planned and documented process. Having the **student-centric approach**, the college develops action plans and academic calendar as per university calendar prior to the commencement of teaching in every academic year for effective implementation of the curriculum and it is documented and monitored.
- The **time table committee** ensures the optimum utilization of time and available resources, taking into consideration of present scenario of the rural students. Besides, separate time table is prepared for using available ICT tools.
- Each department conducts meeting at the opening of the academic year to distribute workload to individual teacher. The paper wise syllabus of each class is discussed in detail and thereafter the papers are allotted to the teacher as per interest and specialization.
- After that each teacher prepares months / week wise teaching plan for the academic year giving due consideration to key factors like the total quantum of the syllabus to be taught, teaching dates and the disposal during the entire year.
- Each teacher maintains the academic daily diary of teaching. Head of department and the Vice Principal monitor the teaching diary.
- Students are provided the syllabus of each paper along with the title of text books and references books.
- Teachers use various teaching methods as per students' interest.
- The teachers also use various techniques for effective teaching such as ICT, educational movies/dramas, and PPT.
- For monitoring the students' progress, the tests, tutorials, projects, seminars are conducted.
- Guest lectures and supplementary classes are conducted by the teachers.
- Remedial classes are carried out for slower learners and advanced learners are encouraged for cocurricular and extracurricular activities.

Implementation:

- Review for syllabus completion is taken by HODs, Vice Principal and Principal periodically.
- IQAC looks after the completion of curriculum in each semester.
- Effective USE of ICT by the teachers through PPT, YouTube channels, and various online plate form

2.3 Teaching- Learning Process

2.3.1 Student centric methods, such as experiential learning, participative learning and problem solving methodologies are used for enhancing learning experiences using ICT tools

Response:

The college ensures the overall development of the students by applying the following methods and activities:

a) Experiential Learning:

- 1. The field visits organized by Departments of Botany, Zoology, Commerce, History, Political Science, Public Administration, Sociology, etc
- 2. The Project work mandatory for B.A., B. Com., B. Sc., M.Com, M. Sc. and M.A. final year students and Environment Project is compulsory for all U G second year.
- 3. Each department encourages students to get an experience of what they are exactly studying in the books. For instance, the theories learned in the classroom practical done in science laboratories, visit to forts help the students of historical events.
- 4. In all science departments Demonstration in practical, models kits were used for Learning through imagination
- 5.Dept. of Political Science and Public Administration students are visited to the local Grampanchayat every year to know the actual procedure of its work.
- 6. The Department of History conducted the survey of ancient temples in Majalgaon region to get financial assistance from the government. The students visited forts, historically significant places.
- 7. The Dept. of Sociology visited Orphanages.
- 8. Remedial coaching classes run by the Department of Mathematics, Physics, Chemistry, and Commerce.
- 9. Curriculum-related various activities and competitions organized for better learning experiences.

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b) Participative Learning Methodology:

- 1. The teachers skillfully employ the pedagogical tool of 'questioning' in their daily classroom activities. By asking questions, the teacher not only makes his teaching lively but also it creates interest for learning among our students.
- 2. The teachers assign the relevant topics to the students for seminars. Accordingly, the students write their seminar papers with the help of reference books and online resources. Finally, the students make presentations of their seminar papers.
- 3. The teachers also organize group discussions
- 4. Besides, the students also participate in field projects. Commerce students went for internships as well as have some linkages and collaborations with industries where our students get training. Going out of the campus, the students undertake a survey and collect data. The collected data is analyzed and finally, the project reports are submitted to the college.
- 5. The students of the college visit various banks, libraries and industries to take a firsthand experience of their transactions and processes.
- 6. The college students have also participated and presented posters and papers in regional Science exhibition competition and national/international level seminars, conferences and poster presentation competitions.

c) Problem Solving Methodology:

The college organizes the Problem-solving methodology through test, assignment of students, in which they push students to meditate on a particular issue that requires resolution. Both teachers and students are involved in the idea to solve problems. Teachers from Mathematics, Physics, Chemistry and Accountancy use this method.

d) Great Learning Platform for Online Learning:

The college has provided virtual and ICT based class rooms to all faculty students. Facilities of computers with internet provided to all departments to promote ICT-based teaching. The college formally collaborates with the country's leading online learning platform – Great Learning. Through it, we provide 4 Quadrant Learning environments to our students. The platform provides facilities to conduct live classes, share recorded videos, distribute text materials, conduct exams, interact through discussion forums and track attendance. 2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms

2.5.1 Mechanism of internal/ external assessment is transparent and the grievance redressal system is time- bound and efficient

Response:

At the beginning of the academic year, in the student induction program, all the students are made aware of the tentative schedule of internal tests, the minimum percentage of attendance, evaluation process, distribution of CA marks, minimum passing marks in theory and practical examinations. As per interactions of IQAC and Heads of the department, the Examination Committee plans and works out reforms in the evaluation system. IQAC prepares an academic calendar which summarizes the events, examinations and all other activities planned in the academic year. The schedule for Internal Tests is prepared by the college Examination Committee. Assignments are given to each student as per the requirements of the examination system of the affiliating university. The examination committee prepares

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the internal theory and practical examination schedule well in advance and it is communicated to the students on the central notice board, and college website and concerned teachers make announcements in the classrooms. The internal examination committee looks after effective monitoring and timely implementation of the internal examination and procedure of evaluation. The syllabus and the university guidelines related to internal examination patterns are communicated to the students well in advance through the college website, in the classrooms and on WhatsApp groups as well as Telegram Channel. The answer sheets are shown to students after evaluation which provides transparency and accountability in the evaluation process. In case of any grievances regarding internal assessment, the student is free to interact with the concerned teacher and get it resolved. Further, he can appeal to the HoDs and Principal as well. Grievances related to oral, project and practical examinations are resolved at the department level.

The college has a specific mechanism about the whole process of External examination as well as its grievances. The college displays the schedule of internal examination related grievances like RR (Result Reserved), EHB (Explicitly Hold Back), etc on notice board and website. The MKCL unit of the office deals with all sort of grievances related to internal examination and forwards to the university. After the declaration of the university result, the MKCL unit of the institution receives the grievance of the students and forwards to the university as per rule and regulation with the coordination of the Examination Committee. The head of the concerned department, and the concerned teacher looks the matter personally and forwards to the Examination Committee. With the help of the Coordinator of examination, the grievances are forwarded quickly through the proper channel to the university in time. Each department keeps the record of the internal examination so the grievances are sorted out quickly. Since the internal examinations are conducted by the respective department, it helps to find out exact issue immediately and address in advance to the MKCL unit. The students are informed about the internal examination related grievances, if any, in the class, on WhatsApp, Telegram groups, by personal call, and display on notice board. Besides, the student mentoring system informs and helps the students to resolve their grievances personally.

Any grievance related to the university question paper like out-of-syllabus, repeated questions, the improper split of marks, marks missed, wrong question number during semester exams, etc. are addressed to the Principal. In turn, he forwards the same to the university immediately.


2.6.1 Programme Outcomes (POs) and Course Outcomes (COs) for all Programmes offered by the

The report replicates all the detail of refresher/orientation/workshop/short term courses of the respective faculty as it is a mandatory procedure for promotion in next grade. It reflects the teacher's involvement in curricular, co-curricular, and extra-curricular activities. Teaching performance is also evaluated through work load, portion taught in the class. Besides, the teacher's involvement in community work as well as in research is pointed out through various social and research awards of the faculty. Special contribution made by the teacher in various field is given due consideration at forwarding in promotion process under Carrier Advancement Scheme. Objectives of Practice:

Deputy Chief Minister of Maharashtra). The practice is undertaken in view of following objectives.

- To sensitize students towards the socio-economic contribution of late Shri. Sundarrao Solanke Saheb.
- To aware students about the political journey of late Shri. Sundarrao Solanke Saheb.
- To help audience to understand the inspirational life-journey of late Shri. Sundarrao Solanke Saheb.
- To understand audience the moral values inculcated in the pure hearted personality of late Shri. Sundarrao Solanke Saheb.
- To shed the light on contribution made in the cooperative sector.

The Context:

The lecture series is focused on the premise of following:

Majalgaon constituency is located on the verge of Sindhaphana River, tributary of The Godavari. The most of the land of Majalgaon Tahsil is fertile and composed of black soil. The visionary leader late Shri. Sundarrao Solanke identified the irrigation need of the Majalgaon Tahsil. BEST PRACTICE: II

Title of Practice:

Rain Water Harvesting

Objectives of the Practice:

- To increase recharge of groundwater by capturing and storing rainwater, by rainwater harvesting from rooftop run-offs.
- To store the water for gardening & washing purpose.

The Context:

Rainwater harvesting, besides being eco-friendly, is a economic practice as well. The freshwater canals or rain-fed natural ponds too can be used for harvesting. Sand gravel filters for purifying rainwater is again something which can be easily arranged. The catchments and settlement tanks built in the area easily free the spot and the vicinity from the curse of flood or water logging, thus saving money of pumping out dirty muddy storm water. The best part of the practice of rainwater harvesting, these rainwater, collected in natural ponds or even in artificial tanks can pour back to the ground thus charging the natural aquifer to boost the groundwater level.

The Practice:

In the SSM campus four building i,e., Art s building, science Building, Sinhgad & Raigad Women hostels where the roof rain water harvesting system have installed. All roof runoff water allowed infiltrating in the ground for the recharging purpose. The stored water is used for the gardening purpose.

Majalgaon has tropical savannah climate with dry conditions prevailing for most of the year. It receives

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about 180 mm of rainfall in June. The amount of rainfall is increased in July to 290 mm. Gradual decrease of rainfall has been observed from July to August (256 mm) and September (160 mm)

Evidence of Success:

In the region because of less rainfall there is scarcity of water in summer. This practice has solved the problem of deficiency of water and the ground level of water has increased. The stored water is supplementary for the gardening and washing purpose.

Problems encountered and resources required:

The college implements rain water harvesting practice from its own resources. To maintain proper accounting of water harvesting it requires expertise knowledge as well as technical support and know-how. The college has some inherent limitations in maintaining water accounting. However, efforts are being taken to harvest and recharge as much water precipitated over the campus buildings as well as open space to recharge the ground water.

We run traditional programmes like B.A., B.Com. and B.Sc. along with new courses like B.C.A.,B.C.S., etc. Taking into consideration the growing demand to the PG courses, the college has introduced like M.Com., M.Sc. Chemistry, M.Sc. Mathematics and M.A. History courses into the college. Along with this college also run 32 certificate courses.
- 7. The academic year 2021-2022 celebrated as the golden jubilee year of the institutes and on the occasion of the birth anniversary of Late Sunderrao Solanke Saheb college has started the lecture series.
- 8. The faculty of the college published 307 research paper in reputed journal, 52 book, and received the research fund of rupees 1872632.
- 9.80% faculty of the college has obtained higher degree as Ph.D and 8 faculties are recognized as research guide.
- 10. The college successfully offers its students SWAYAM NPTEL MOOCs since 2020 and Career Katta since 2021.
- 11. The college also hosted 02 International level conference and 41 National level conferences/Seminars/Workshops on burning issues of the society.

- 14. To connect with the community, college was engaged in extensive activities viz., Organ donation awareness programme, lifelong extension activities, tree plantation, online essay competition, online quiz competition, CORONA vaccination camp, COVID-19 awareness programme and quiz, Mental health awareness programme, Sunderrao Solanke Lecture series, Research on social issue, participation in AIDS awareness, Environment awareness, Electoral awareness, Dowry Prohibition, Drought affected area donation rallies etc. & the celebration of birth and death anniversaries as well as various special days, etc were continued in this pandemic, too. assisted government agencies and NGOs in delivering effective public services. Their collaborative initiatives have bridged the gap between the institute and the society and developed in student's social sensitivity, scientific approach, dignity of labour, constructive attitude to environment, team spirit, human and ethical values, discipline and thirst for excellence and knowledge.
